# 20 Years... A Tithing Congregation

In February of 2004, several members of our congregation attended a Transformational Conference in Charlotte, NC. I attended the conference and as chair of the Stewardship Committee that year I attended primarily Stewardship related breakout meetings at the conference. One breakout meeting I went to was hosted by a pastor from the St. Louis area, she talked to us about the benefits of churches becoming tithing congregations and in the process transforming themselves from maintenance oriented congregations (which we were at the time) to missions oriented congregations (which we have since become) and how this would enable churches to become outward looking bodies of worship. After attending the conference, I visited with Pastor Scott and asked him for his opinion on whether he thought our church could become a tithing congregation. He said it was worth a try, and at the March 2004 Session meeting the Session approved our church becoming a tithing congregation. With Session approval, we also were on our way to becoming a mission oriented church. 2005 marked our first full year as a tithing congregation. It was also the first year that we split our tithing income giving 50% to Presbytery and retaining 50% of our tithing income for our own church's mission projects. **2025 marks 20 years of our being a tithing congregation!** 

Around 2011 we developed a mission-oriented plan for dispersing our tithing funds. We continued to give 50% of our mission funds to Presbytery and we decided to support missions on four levels: International (missions outside America), Regional (the greater United States), Regional (the area covered by our Synod) and local (the area supported by our church). On all four levels, we support both Presbyterian and non-Presbyterian missions.

Starting in 2011 and for the next 9 years, we prepared an annual Missions Booklet showing the mission projects that we supported the previous year. This includes both narratives and photos of missions being supported. We also give a financial summary of the previous year's mission support. On the Sunday in January before our annual meeting, we would present this Mission Booklet to the congregation and have Pastor Scott offer a Missions Blessing for the upcoming year. Our website has a missions page where we show the importance First Presbyterian Church places on missions!

Something else that has happened over the past several years is the number of private missions projects that we are now funding. Projects like the weekend food program for students, the Reed Gray backpack program, water park tickets for families, food shelf donations, Imagination Library etc. have all benefited from private donations.

This is a brief history of our Missions Program over the past 20 years since we became a Tithing Congregation!

Per-Cap vs Tithing

### Per-Capita vs Presbytery's share of our tithing fund.

Concerns have been raised about the uses of the tithing income and to what use the Presbytery makes of the 50% of collections we send them quarterly. Questions like are these funds being used to pay wages at Presbytery plus other operational expenses on the Presbytery level. Here is a short answer to these questions... The tithing funds that we give Presbytery go for Presbyterian church mission projects at the Presbytery, Synod and General Assembly levels. This money goes for mission projects, not for wages, travel expenses, ect.

The Per-Capita is the cost to our church for us, as individuals, for being members of the Presbyterian Church. In 2025, our church will pay \$7,065 for each of us to be a Presbyterian!

Where does this money go? Part of this money goes to the Presbytery to help pay their day-to-day expenses, and part of it goes to the Synod and to the General Assembly for the same reasons. The per-capita costs are what pays salaries and keeps the doors open for all three level of the Presbyterian church.

The per-capita and tithing funds that we send to the Presbytery of MN Valleys are separate funds with separate uses. As far as we know, they are never co-mingled together.
